
Are you unsure which is the lengthwise and the crosswise grain of the fabric?

The way to tell is to let the fabric SING to you. Here's how: Place one edge of the fabric in each hand with some slack in the fabric. Pull the fabric taught It will make a sound. Listen to the pitch of that sound Now repeat in the other direction You will notice a difference in the pitch of the sound The HIGHER Pitch is the lengthwise grain The LOWER Pitch is the crosswise grain.
