Program Notes

October Meeting – Guest Speaker Bridget O'Flaherty

Our guest speaker at the October 24th meeting is local fibre artist Bridget O'Flaherty.

Bridget O'Flaherty is best known for her stunning large landscapes created with thread. Using her sewing machine, Bridget builds up layers of multi-coloured thread 'drawing' to convey her landscape art. With an environmental and sustainable focus, she explores the use of local, organic and natural hand-dyed fabrics and materials in her works. An award-winning artist with over 25 years' experience in the fibre art world, Bridget's work is showcased in national galleries, and she teaches and lectures internationally.

Bridget's fibre art is inspired by nature and biodiversity. She is passionate about our environment and creates intimate connections to the landscape. She conveys fragile aspects of eco-systems and advocates for awareness of species at risk, native and invasive species in nature and sustainable materials in textiles.

Bridget's presentation is titled "My Journey as a Fibre Artist".



What's it like to start a quilting career at a young age? What were some of the trials and highlights? What does it take to start again after a break? I will take you through the 26 years of my career as a fibre artist, from early beginnings to influences and highlighting special projects. This lecture includes a trunk show of quilts from my career, a digital image and video presentation.

Quilt Block Groups

At the September meeting we introduced a new model for setting up and orchestrating the various regular activities involved in a guild meeting. This is a great way for every member to contribute and feel more involved with the guild (and it will lighten the load on the guild executive.)

- holding up and folding quits for guest speakers
- putting tables and extra chairs away at the end of the meeting. (Meeting attendees will still be are asked to put their own chairs away at the end of the meeting)

Each member is asked to volunteer only once during the year. If it is your night to volunteer, please arrive by 6 PM. If unable to take part at a given time, a member can switch with another member or be reassigned to a different group.

As a result of adopting this new model, the snack Sign Up that the Social Committee asked members to sign up for, is no longer applicable.

The "Flying Geese" group, coordinated by Vickie MacNabb will be kicking off this new initiative at our October meeting.

The beautiful quilt "Many Threads Bind Us Together-Community", which will be raffled off at our 2019 quilt show, was on display for the summer at Sew Inspired.

A Quilter and a Tornado

Many of you are likely aware that our fellow guild member and past president, **Brigid Whitnall** and her husband Ken were severely affected by the tornado when it passed through Dunrobin on September 21st. Here is Brigid's firsthand account of their experience.

Let me start by saying that this story is written from my perspective, I know there are Guild members across the Ottawa Valley I pray that no one else was impacted to such an extent. Some of you lost power, I truly hope that is the extent of it. Here goes the journey so far.


We were in PEI, staying at the Cliffside Inn on the Northumberland Straight with seals playing in the water and beautiful sunrises that need to be made into art quilts. On Friday night, just after supper, I received a text that a bad storm had hit Dunrobin and was I ok. Well yes, we are on vacation! That text was the start of numerous texts, emails and photos being sent. The main media photo being used was of our front neighbour's red car overturned - which is horrible enough. When you know the neighborhood and look at the photo, the house in the background is my next door neighbour and wait, where's our houseoh, it's the pile of rubble next door. Not good, to put it mildly. My heart sank!

We started making plans on Friday night to come home right away. Unfortunately, PEI had a wind and rain storm that night and ferry service was cancelled. Robert, our Inn Keeper was wonderful, with the 70 Mile Coastal Yard sale happening, streets were clogged up and slow. He gave us the "secret" back road shortcut. He helped us cancel the rest of our bookings, ferries that had been reserved, he went above and beyond in so many ways. We owe him a debt of gratitude. This is the starting point to the kindness of strangers as well as friends and family.

The ride home was quiet as the driver concentrated on the road, the passenger was the communications manager answering texts, messengers, emails... etc. My mom in the back seat was on moose duty. Happy to report the only two moose we saw were fiberglass! There are a lot of moose signs in New Brunswick and eastern Quebec... just saying.

Dropped off my mom in Cornwall, then drove home, just kind of bracing ourselves. Got home on Sunday. We were very tired from no sleep and lots of driving. Sunday afternoon we were escorted to the site where our house was and we started looking for things. The first responders refer to us as "the people who were in PEI with a look of concern on their faces". They say: Oh, you are those people, want to sit down before we proceed? Going there on Sunday afternoon was good in the sense that not everyone was around. Monday, with more rain in forecast, priority was to get tarps down so that rain in next day or two won't do more damage. We had a bungalow and our main floor is now our roof. It was easier to tarp off than some of the other homes.

Good news is, we found some of the bed quilts and recovered some valuables. At the end of the day, it's all just stuff and we have our lives.


As this journey progresses we continue to feel how blessed we are. We are blessed that each of our hobbies were saved. My husband had just finished his observatory and it was still standing with all his telescopes and eye pieces intact.

My quilting stuff was in the basement and the basement is pretty much what we have left. Some of it is wet, from windows being blown out. Most is ok. The process has started of washing and ironing all the fabric to ensure it is all mold free and clean.

This is my favorite photo. This firefighter rescued my disappearing nine patch quilt, it was quilted by Mary Stanton and is one of my favorites.



This is a book that got soaked... I actually am looking for a replacement of this book ... any ideas where I can find one?



Our living room couch was in bits about 1 block from our house. The love seat was wrapped around the light pole across the street. To put it in perspective, the living room was at the back of the house. Our marriage certificate was found in someone's garage, three houses down the street. I won't go into the underwear and office supplies all over the lawn.

Our insurance advisors took pictures of my stash (what they could see) and feel confident everything can be replaced that needs to be replaced, I am not so sure they understand the math of that... rulers, fabric, notions... they asked how much fabric I havewhat? how do I know? 4-5 bookcases worth, plus bins of projects! I had a couple of embroidery hoops that were broken. I don't know what the humidity will have done to my thread.

This is all very surreal, we are so very thankful for everyone offering up help and as this will be a long ordeal, we will hopefully give everyone an opportunity to help at some point. My Pfaff machines were given a clean bill of health. One was thrown on the floor from the sewing table toppling over, the Sew Steady extension did not make it, and the other (my Pfaff Passport) was in a suitcase type carrier and stored on the main floor ... that was found about 30-40 feet away from where it was supposed to be. The bag looked pretty bad, I did not open it until I had to and was shocked that the inside looked intact. Wow - Pfaff should be advertising this suitcase!! I expect the verdict on my Sweet 16 in the next few days.

Some people have found things up to 4 km away from home. The neighborhood looks bad on the news, but you don't see the glass, nails, bits of insulation, holes in the lawns, all the stuff everywhere, houses half open. It's awful to look at.

I found the Canada 150 symbol too late to save it. It was partially buried in the flower bed.



I cannot thank everyone enough for the well wishes, the kind words and support. We truly feel very blessed as we go through this ordeal. There were very few injuries in our area and everyone coming together and supporting each other is beyond words. This could have been worse, it could have been people hurt instead of things.

It's only been four weeks, it feels like four lifetimes. We have spent the last week inserting some "normal" in our life. I am resuming quilt guild activities, classes, and look forward to sewing in the next week. I joked at last week's Interguild meeting about designing my new sewing room and sharing those ideas with other guilds. I may have speaking in my future! I have challenges that I want to get started on all the normal quilting stuff we do at our guilds. I had the privilege of donating a quilt to a fundraising event this week and as I write this someone called to let me know the quilt went for its full value... yeah Dunrobin Strong! I had finished the quilt some time ago and knew it would likely be donated.

Thanks again for all your thoughts, prayers and well wishes.
