## Log Cabin Block

Early Log Cabin blocks were hand-pieced using strips of fabrics around a central square. In traditional Log Cabin blocks, one half is made of dark fabrics and the other half light. A red center symbolized the hearth of home and a yellow center represented a welcoming light in the window. It has been suggested, that during the Civil War, a Log Cabin quilt with a black center hanging on a clothesline was meant to signal a stop for the Underground Railroad.

Make one $91 / 2$ in block. The Strips are $1 \frac{1}{2}$ inches wide.


Start with a centre block of $1 \frac{1}{2}$ by $1 \frac{1}{2}$ inches.

Strip 1 - light $1 \frac{1}{2}$ inches long,
Strip 3 - dark $21 / 2$ inches long,
Square should now measure $31 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 31 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
Strip 5 - light $31 / 2$ inches long,
Strip 7 - dark $41 / 2$ inches long,

Strip 2 - light $21 / 2$ inches long
Strip 4 - dark $31 / 2$ inches long

Strip 6 - light 412 inches long
Strip 8 - dark $51 / 2$ inches long

Square should now measure $5^{1 / 2 \prime} \times 5^{1 ⁄ 22^{\prime \prime}}$

Strip 9 - light $51 ⁄ 2$ inches long,
Strip 11 - dark $61 / 2$ inches long,
Square should now measure $71 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 71 / 2{ }^{\prime \prime}$
Strip 13 - light $71 / 2$ inches long,
Strip 15 - dark $81 / 2$ inches long
Square should now measure $91 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 91 / 2{ }^{\prime \prime}$

Strip 10 - light $61 / 2$ inches long
Strip 12 - dark $71 / 2$ inches long

Strip 14 - light $8 ½$ inches long
Strip 16 - dark $91 / 2$ inches long
