The note on the label should detail what new thing you tried, whether a technique, ruler, or template. You may want to try a modern version of a traditional block.

The program team and I just returned from an Inter guild meeting where 17 local guilds were in attendance. We have these meetings twice a year and it is a great way of sharing knowledge and experience. We decided to move ahead with the Canada 150 project and I am on that committee! At the October meeting, I will share what some of the other guilds are doing. I will be asking the guild members for ideas and themes for our own contribution. We can vote in November on what we would like to do based on the ideas that come in.

On a final note, our Charity and Program folks are hard at work planning and coordinating various activities and requests that have come in to the guild. We will be looking to the members for participation in these various activities and some of the timelines are short (i.e. Placemats and Christmas stockings). I want to thank everyone ahead of time! We will be providing cut out fabric for **Christmas stockings** at the October meeting. The stockings will be given to the Arnprior Food bank, which provide 200 boxes of Christmas fare for families . If you wish, you can make up stockings with your own fabric. The stockings will be filled with personal grooming supplies- toothbrush, paste, shampoo and soaps etc. The CWL (Catholic Women's League) will supply the contents. However if you wish to provide contents they will not be refused.

Another of our Christmas projects are **placemats** for Meals on Wheels. Similar to last year, the reversible placemats should have Christmas fabric on one side and non-Christmas on the other. The size of the placemats is not specific, but average size is 14" x 18".

After September's meeting The Railroad Crossing charity quilt was presented to a guild member's husband (who preferred not to be identified) who is suffering from cancer, for which they are very grateful for our efforts and generosity.

Challenges

It is not too late to sign up for any of the following challenges if you weren't here last month or if you forgot to do so. We were very happy with the number of the people who did. Also thank you to all who took time to fill out a survey.

Bed Runner: Many of our kids and grandchildren are not "into quilts". When I have travelled, I have noticed that condos and hotels are using bed runners instead of bedspreads, for obvious reasons. This is a modern way to use your quilting. You can make a bed runner for the fall and a different one for the spring etc. We thought that it might be an idea to use as a gift for Xmas, weddings, graduation or for the spare room etc. It will be less work than a whole quilt, less fabric, less money and you will finish it! Let's bring these in for the May meeting.

Shoebox: Put a foreign block in a shoebox, along with your scraps and any fabric that you would like to add. They will be traded, finished in a pattern decided by the receiver of the box and returned to the owner at the June meeting. The quilter can add fabric of their own but should try to use most of what is in the shoebox. You won't believe what creative minds this guild has! Why not give it a try!

I Spy! I spy several members who will do this challenge! Sign up for the challenge at break time and we'll let you know how many 6" blocks you bring in each month. Since I didn't understand how it worked, maybe someone else won't either. If we have 9 members in a group, then you bring in 9 pieces of the same fabric or they can be different. Someone will sort them out during the meeting, and you will go home with a group of 9 different fabric (including your own) that night. Each month you repeat the same process, bringing a different fabric. We have a theme for the month, so the variety keeps varying. We are giving you a list of all the months in case you want to shop all in one visit.

October - Animals-far

November - Animals-wild

December - Toys

January - Construction machines

February - Transportation-cars, trucks, airplanes, buses etc

March - Fish

April - Good-vegetables & fruit

May - Birds

June - Sports

Border Print Workshop

This quilt is so much fun and you will enjoy the surprising results because no one can guess how their quilt will look in the end. The entire inside quilt is created from one border print or striped motif! You will cut and sew most of the blocks in this workshop. It is a simple pattern so everyone can do it. Maximum is 15 people. See the samples on display. at the Guild meeting. Date is **Saturday, Oct. 31, at the Library, 9:30-3 pm.**

You can still join if you can go shopping at this late date. The cost is \$25.

Machine Quilting workshop - Wednesday, Feb. 24, 11 am - 4 pm. Teacher: Pat Campbell. The cost: \$25

Workshops are available to all members who sign up and are held at the Arnprior & District Library (www.arnprior.library.on.ca) on the Saturday following the guild meeting (unless otherwise stated), from 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.

Retreats

We've decided to offer two retreats this year. *Providence Point* in Lanark is the location because it is close and the facilities meet our needs and their prices are great. We chose the two months of the year that we find we need to have something exciting to cheer us up! We decided to have **Monday-Thursday (November 16-19)** during the week for those of us who could get away and then **Thursday to Sunday (January 21-24)** for those who work, wanting a winter break but can't go south or want to go twice. We need a minimum of 16 and maximum of 22. First people with their cheques to us are the ones in. All taxes included:

\$187 Friday after dinner to brunch on Sunday

2-3 people /room depending on the number going. Most rooms have their own full bathrooms. Everyone would have their own 5-6 foot table. No need to put anything away till the end of the retreat. Food served there is good quality. Feel free to bring a bottle of wine or snacks for the evenings. Tea and coffee available all day.

Providence Point is a year round retreat centre in Lanark. We have a tentative booking there for Mon.-Thurs., Nov. 16- 19 and Thurs., -Sun. Jan. 21-24. We need to get 16 people to hold our date, otherwise it could be booked to another group or will be cancelled. Therefore if you are interested, we need to have your cheque(s) now. We will accept 2 cheques - a deposit of \$100 now and then the balance in another cheque postdated to January 4th. Numbers will be confirmed before Christmas. January books up fast as everyone is looking for a staycation in the winter.

Do You Use FRIXION Pens? What you should know. If you're not familiar with Frixion pens, they are a line of pens and highlighters made by Pilot that are erasable. After quilting, you simply steam the ink lines away. Pilot did not design the pens for fabric and did not test them on fabric while developing the concept. But quilters/textile artists had problems with the pens. Sometimes they left a mark after steaming the initial mark away. If the quilt got cold, the marks reappeared. 
